A Farewell to Taz - our beloved Canadian Lynx



There is something about a cat - some call it aloof, others call it majestic. We just called her Taz, our very special Canadian Lynx.

Taz was born in a captive breed and release program in Wisconsin in 1993. Within a year, breeders noticed she was having difficulty. Tests revealed that Taz was born without inner ear drums - she was totally deaf. She could not be released to the wild or kept for breeding. Rather than destroy her, the program looked for a facility that would house and care for her for the remainder of her natural life. In 1994, Taz moved into her habitat at The Wildlife Sanctuary in Ellijay, GA.

Canadian lynx generally live 8 to 12 years in the wild, and up to 14 in captivity. Lynx have dense fur that is silvery brown and may bear blackish markings. In summer, its coat takes on a more reddish brown color. It has a furry ruff resembling a double-pointed beard, a short tail with a black tip, and long furry tufts on its ears. Its long legs with broad furred feet aid in traveling through deep snow. In the wild, their main food is the snowshoe hare and birds.

Taz was 17 years old, a testament to the love and care all the animals receive at the sanctuary. In captivity, Taz ate chicken. Over the years, she had beaten several bouts of pneumonia as she got older. However, in April her breathing became labored. X-rays revealed an aggressive cancerous growth wrapped around her esophagus. Although surgery was considered, it became obvious that she wouldn't have much time even if she survived.

Taz was used in educational programs all over the country, so that young and old alike could come in actual contact with a 60 pound wild animal. However, due to her deafness, Taz was totally dependent on human care, and as docile as a house cat. Literally tens of thousands of school age children were able to pet Taz without a single scratch or bite.

In her later years, Taz began to lose her eyesight, and was walked

Because she could not hear, she had what was called a purr growl - something she could feel instead of hear. However, many a would-be pet was quickly withdrawn when Taz purred. Yet no one was ever harmed.

The Wildlife Sanctuary is dedicated to the love and care of injured or orphaned wild animals. When possible, the animals are nursed to health and released. When this isn't possible, they are housed, fed and loved at the sanctuary. And, just as with our beloved house pets, a day comes when extending their life would only extend their suffering, and a tough and emotionally painful decision has to be made.

That day has come for Taz. She will be laid to rest on the grounds of the sanctuary near her beloved caretaker, Craig "Grizzly" Cylke, where future visitors can come and learn her story, along with the many other animals that have passed through the loving hands at The Wildlife Sanctuary.

to get to it. It is amazing that a black bear weighing more than you or me can be so agile. It can also be deadly. Bears can be injured by falling, cut by broken glass, or get their head stuck in the feeder and suffocate. Even if they break the globe, the bottom ring around their neck will choke them to death or prevent them from swallowing as they grow, so they can slowly die from starvation. Think a bear can't get to a suspended feeder?



This is a young, hungry female that weighs about 200 pounds. That is a birdfeeder suspended from 300 pound strength nylon rope. So, we recommend quick disconnect bird feeders. One place you can get them is at [Wild Birds Unlimited](#) in Woodstock, GA. Take them in at night so the bears don't stake them out for an early morning raid.

Who Do You Know Who Could Help?
